

Hello,

I am a Duck Creek neighbor and this coming June I have been challenged to ride a 100 mile endurance bike ride to raise \$4500.00 to fund the eradication of the scourge of blood cancers in our lifetime. Between now and June I will train by riding more than 1000 miles.

In this endeavor, I have joined the North Texas Chapter of Team in Training (TNT) which is the money raising arm of the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society. Last year 1,800 bicycle riders from across the US raised over \$9 million for cancer research during this one day event. The North Texas TNT, by itself, contributed over \$350,000. In the course of the last 20 years TNT has raised an incredible \$800 million! Drugs that patients are using today were not available even two years ago, so immense progress has been made. Today, more than 823,000 Americans are battling blood cancers.

This fund raising effort is personal to me because, in the course of the past year, I have lost one friend to leukemia and am slowly losing another to T-cell lymphoma. Bill L., a lymphoma patient has been battling T-cell Lymphoma for more than seven years. He has had numerous rounds of chemotherapy and even endured one highly experimental stem cell transplant. Bill is currently in the hospital dealing with complications from the cancer and its debilitating treatments. He is one of Leukemia & Lymphoma Society's Honored Heroes. Several members of this year's TNT Cycling Team are honoring Bill as their inspiration to complete the training and the 100 mile ride.

These are difficult times and there are many worthy causes but, if you are able, please consider supporting this cause. Any donation, no matter how small, will make a difference. 

Critters of the Creek The Coyote (Canis latrans)

or better or worse, Duck Creek lies within the active range of a variable and transient population of urban coyotes. While not frequently seen, it is a safe bet that there is a mating pair and their offspring somewhere along the creek in our neighborhood; most likely at the northwest end of our area on the Housely Farm property. If you are out along that portion of the creek after dark and an emergency vehicle happens to pass nearby with its siren wailing, you will almost certainly hear their distinctive howls.



Richardson Animal Control sets traps to catch these critters alive when they are notified of a problem. In fact, the city has a contract with a trapper whose job it is to find, capture and remove coyotes from our area. I am told that there is a "large" population of coyotes living and scavenging happily in the business and light industrial area just north and west of the intersection of Arapaho and Plano Road. Last winter, animal control personnel told me that they had taken more than two dozen of these animals out of that area and that "that was just the tip of the iceberg."

Coyotes are slightly larger than the average sized dog. In Texas, they normally weigh about 30 pounds. They are classified as "opportunistic carnivores, (which) readily eat fish, rabbits, rodents, deer, and carrion, as well as birds, plants, insects, and even small domestic animals." (wildtexas.com.) They are quite content to eat garbage when they can get it. Dissected coyote stomachs have also revealed vegetable matter and insects.

Interestingly enough, around 100 years ago, coyotes were not native to this part of Texas. The predominant large predator/scavenger was the red wolf. Human enterprises such as lumbering, ranching and farming eradicated the red wolf and opened up this ecosystem for the more versatile coyote.

Another rather interesting bit of trivia is that in terms of economic importance, the coyote is the second most important fur bearing animal in the state. This harvest is exceeded in dollar value only by the raccoon.

The breeding season usually begins in January and terminates around May. They only have one litter per season which might consist of anywhere from two to 12 pups. The young are nearly full grown by November. The large litters are necessary because the mortality rate is very high. Coyotes, especially pups, are vulnerable to predation from hawks or owls and even other coyotes. Few of these animals live more than six to eight years in the wild.

Coyotes can be active during daylight hours, but they are normally most active just after dusk and before sunrise. To scotch one old bit of folklore, there is no evidence that coyotes howl at the moon. "Coyote vocalizations were not related to the intensity of moonlight...but coyotes vocalized more often during nights without moonlight than on nights

with a full moon...The increased vocalizations on nights without a moon may have compensated for a presumed lower ability to see other coyotes during lower light." (texnat.tamu.edu.)

These animals instinctively shy away from contact with humans. However, they may become habituated to people if fed, either deliberately or accidentally through poor trash disposal techniques. They are very intelligent and adaptable and quickly learn to avoid

poisons and traps. And even though they not normally approach humans, there are documented instances of pets being taken by coyotes right here in our neighborhood, even in the presence of the pet owner! It is always a good idea to keep your animals secured and confined at night. Cats, which are very close to rabbit size, would no doubt be considered a welcome morsel by most coyotes.

You can how about it if you want to, but it looks as though the coyotes are here to stay.

Velvet Snout Owner Laura Couch says "The Velvet Snout is going to run this program as long as there is a need for it." "We really hope someday soon that there's no longer a need, but for now, sadly, that's just not the case."


Retiring Old Glory
