As mandated by the current "Robin Hood" system of school finance, RISD will return more than \$ 50 million dollars to the state. This equates to almost \$1 million dollars lost to each school in the district and \$1,800 less per student than the annual state average.

- to purchase state-of-the-art equipment for instruction
- to pay for leadership or SAT/ACT prep instructors
- to pay sponsors to support student participation in extracurricular competitions
- to keep class sizes smaller; to provide academic enrichments and experiences
- to award "Grants for Good Ideas" for teachers to enhance classroom academics

Richardson, J. J. Pearce and Lake Highlands, the other three high schools in the district, already have these types of funds successfully established. It is time for Berkner area residents and businesses to rise to this challenge.

The future of academic excellence at Berkner High School depends on all of us. A tax deductible investment in the Berkner Excellence in Education Fund will ensure that BHS remains a school where academic excellence is the standard and continued improvement is the goal. Everyone of you should be given a pat on the back and a hug for all of your hard work and your efforts to make our community the very best! Now for some other news. The Police Department has upgraded the Crime Map and there is a sign up box on the web site. When you sign up you will receive a weekly crime report from the previous week from the Richardson areas you requested. The report is upgraded every Sunday. There is no fee and once you are signed up you will not have to

continue pulling up the crime map because the information will automatically be sent to you. Please go to www.cor.net and then click on the police department. You will see a map of the city and a link to sign up. Please check out the new site.



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Neighborhood Revitalization

all is a good time for all of us to go out in the yard and spend a few minutes looking at our trees and landscaping. Most of the homes in the Duck Creek area are 30 years or older. A large number of those small trees and scrubs that were planted in the late 70's have now had time to grow into massive trees and they can easily dwarf our yards. A good indication of this is tree limbs growing over property lines, rubbing on residence walls and roofs, and draping over pools, power lines and alleys. Also, do you have problems growing grass under the big trees due to too much shade? If you haven't already done this, strongly consider having a professional tree service trim or thin out your trees. For a reasonable cost this can make a huge improvement in your home's appearance and the increased sun light filtering to the ground will help the growth of your grasses and scrubs. The professionals can do this job quickly and safely, and most will either haul off the debris or pile it in your front yard for City of Richardson (COR) bulky trash pickup. (Don't forget to call COR in advance and request a pickup. Bulky trash pickup for our area is Thursday mornings).

Look at all of your landscaping and flower beds. Are they a little outdated? Over years, those wax leaf ligustrums, red tip photinias, and 'dwarf' yaupons can take over the flower beds. If this is the case, start making plans to redo the landscaping and flower beds before next growing season. This will improve the appearance of the property and maintain your property value. Local nurseries can suggest plants that are easy to maintain and are recommended for our North Texas climate. Look around our neighborhood and you will see that several residents have added new rock borders

and/or accent lights to their landscaping that really showcases their new landscaping. If you don't have a sprinkler system, this may also be a good time to consider installing one. With water restrictions looking like something all North Texans will have to learn to live with, a sprinkler system with a timer to allow controlled watering during late night or early morning hours is fast becoming a "need" rather than a "want." (Keep in mind this time of the year sprinkler contractors do not normally have a backlog of work and they may be willing to offer you a discounted price to get your business.)

While you're at it, take a good look at your neighbor's homes, maybe they also could stand to do some work to improve the appearance of their residence and landscape. A suggestion may be all it takes to get your neighbors to upgrade their property. Remember, we all have a stake in doing whatever we can to maintain and improve the overall image and appearance of our Duck Creek neighborhood. Let's continue to keep our neighborhood neat and appealing for years to come, and make it a place where future generations will want to call "Home".

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Neighborhood Stabilization

The City of Richardson is concerned about our neighborhoods and has created an advisory panel to review current policies and ensure future preservation of these neighborhoods. At the work session on November 5th, the advisory board gave their recommendations. They decided that neighborhood preservation should be initiated within the neighborhood itself. Richardson has a wide diversity of architecture and the board felt that if a neighborhood wanted to preserve the look of the area they live in, they should be pro-active and take internal steps for preservation. The advisory board is calling the process of preservation Neighborhood Stabilization Overlays or (NSO) The NSO goal is not to restrict new construction, remodeling and expansion, but to build with a certain architectural style in mind to keep a distinctive look of a neighborhood or section of a neighborhood. The NSO can be set up by a committee of at least ten property owners within a certain size area. They must sign and submit an application to be considered.

If this is something you want to investigate, you may visit the city web site for the details and contact the HOA. We can see if there is enough interest to standardize our architecture within Duck Creek and keep developers from building something that doesn't fit our neighborhood.

Duck Creek Crime Watch Patrol







A Duck That Represents ALL Duck Creek Residents

Your Richardson Duck Creek Homeowners Association (RDCHOA) has created, purchased and, with the help of our Duck Creek Crime Watch Patrol (CWP), will be delivering to you a unique and descriptive sticker for each of your vehicles. What would be more descriptive for a Duck Creek vehicle that a duck. Yes - a single dark green with white neck band, duck covering most of the 2" by 2" white background. There are no words, no slogan, and no catchy phrases. Just our green Duck Creek duck. Curious? Interested? Well, here is exactly what your sticker will look like:



Who will get these stickers?

ALL Duck Creek residents will get one 2" by 2" sticker for each of their vehicles.

How will we receive our stickers?

The stickers will be personally delivered. Your 27 CWP members will take the lead with the delivery process. They will be assisted by the some HOA folks. The 5 Quadrant Leaders, each Block Captain, and many of the HOA board members will participate.

What will we do with the sticker?

Each sticker will be applied to the outside of the rear window of the vehicle. For uniformity and optimal visibility, the sticker will be placed on the lower portion of the driver' side. For some vehicles, the sticker may be more visible if moved upward somewhat. The slope of the rear window and current stickers may influence final location.

Why does Duck Creek have these stickers?

First, we would like to further develop and symbolize our Duck Creek pride. We want other motorists to observe and think "what does the green duck mean?" Have you looked at some of the individualized license plates and tried to figure out what the numbers and/or letters were trying to say? **Second**, we would like to increase the effectiveness of our Crime Watch Patrol. They are touring your streets and alleys looking for criminal activity or crime clues. The Duck Creek sticker on your vehicles tells the CWP crew that those vehicles belong in Duck Creek. If a vehicle is parked in your driveway and two men are loading a TV, that vehicle had better have a green duck sticker in the lower driver side of the rear window. The absence of the Duck Creek sticker will be another CLUE that further investigation is indicated.

What do we do if we have further questions or comments?

The best mechanism is to go onto the HOA web site at <u>www.rdchoa.org</u> and utilize one of the active links to create a written question or comment. The HOA web site also provides the names and phone numbers of board members if you don't have internet capability or if you just want to speak with a live body.

Critters of the Creek

If you maintain a bird feeder in this neighborhood, you have probably seen some new comers to our area.

The first and, by far, most exotic is an import from South America called a <u>Monk Parakeet</u>. It is called a Monk or Quaker parakeet because it's gray face reminded birdwatchers of a monk's hood. A bright green bird, slightly larger than a blue jay, it has gray under parts, a long green tail and bright blue/green flight feathers.

This noisy bird lives in flocks and loves commercial birdseed. It is regarded as an agricultural pest in it's native Argentina. It is also considered non-migratory,

so the birds you see are going to stay here. Since it is a native of South American uplands it is more easily acclimated to our weather than some other exotics.

Another relatively new arrival to our feeders is the <u>White-Winged Dove</u>. A bit larger than the more common Mourning Dove, this native of northern Mexico and the Rio Grande Valley has been moving north over the past few decades. Interestingly, ornithologists report that it's colonization route follows a northerly track along I 35.

It is recognized by the defining white wing patches clearly visible when at rest or in flight. It also has a short, rounded tail

rather than the longer, narrower tail of the Mourning Dove. The tail itself has white patches.

The <u>Eurasian Collared-Dove</u> is a beautiful new import. Its original range was warmer temperate regions from southeastern Europe to Japan. This is a small dove, buff grey with a darker back and a blue-grey wing patch. The tail feathers are tipped white. It has a black half-collar on its nape from which it gets its name. The short legs are red and the bill is black. The iris is reddish brown, but from a distance the eyes appear to be black, as the pupil is relatively large and only a narrow rim of reddish-brown eye color can be seen around the black pupil.

This is a gregarious species, and winter flocks will form where there are food supplies such as grain. Its impact on native species is as yet unknown; it appears to occupy an ecological niche between that of the Mourning Dove and Rock Pigeon.

If you sight any other out-of-the-ordinary birds in our area I would be very interested to hear of them.
