

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#### A FLIGHT THROUGH HISTORY

This year's Annual Duck Creek Independence Day Parade began with a fly-over by a North American AT-6, WWII trainer aircraft provided by the Cavanaugh Flight Museum at the nearby Addison Airport.

The Cavanaugh Flight Museum is the vision and passion of founder Jim Cavanaugh. His uncompromising standards and patriotism have produced a world-class museum and award winning aircraft. Over 30 planes fill 50,000 square feet of immaculate, fully enclosed museum facilities at Addison Airport.

One person who has contributed to the success of the museum through his volunteer efforts is also the person who helped Bill Denton secure the fly-over for the parade, Richardson resident John Awezec. John's interest in aviation goes back many years, and here is his story.

John Awezec enlisted in the Army Air Corps on January 30, 1943. He graduated as a rated pilot on March 12, 1944 with the rank of Second Lieutenant and was sent to Smyrna, Tennessee for B-24 transition training for first pilots. The next stop was Lincoln Nebraska where he and his fellow airmen were assembled into bombardment crews. The next stop brought him to Biggs Field Army Air Force Base in El Paso, Texas for Replacement Training Unit (RTU) training. The RTU training consisted of practice bombing, gunnery, and formation flying both as a squadron as well as a group. In August 1944, the majority of the crews were sent to Italy to join the war. A select group of about 6 crews (John's included) were sent to Will Rogers Field, Oklahoma for reconnaissance training. John trained in an F-7 (a B-24 modified for photo reconnaissance). To make the F-7, the rear bomb doors were sealed shut and three cameras were installed. Two auxiliary fuel tanks were carried in the front bomb bay. According to John, "Other than that, it was a standard B-24 with no difference in operating characteristics".

In October 1944, training was completed and the crews were sent to Georgia for deployment to Italy. Before deployment, it was determined that they were not need in Italy so they were once again transferred, this time to Buckley Field, Colorado. Three crews, John's included were selected for deployment to the Pacific, but before their departure, the flight leader replaced John and his crew with a crew led by the flight leader's friend. Disappointed at being replaced but determined to do his part, John applied for a transfer to a nearby B-29 transition school at Lowrey Field Colorado. On January 10, 1945, John received his first flight in an F-13 (a B-29 modified for photo reconnaissance). He was subsequently assigned to the 1st Photo Reconnaissance Squadron based at Smokey Hill Army Air Force Base, Selina, Kansas. In August 1945 after completion of his training, he was sent to Topeka, Kansas for deployment to the Pacific. John's mission was to map the coastline of Japan in preparation for invasion. The Japanese islands of Honshu and Hokkaido were scheduled for invasion in

November 1945 and March 1946, respectively. On August 6, 1945, the atomic bomb was dropped on Hiroshima and on the 9th a second atomic bomb was dropped on Nagasaki; the war came to an end shortly thereafter. John's group was deployed to the Pacific and spent a short time at Tinian Airfield, quartered with the 509th Composite Squadron (the outfit that dropped the atomic bombs). He was eventually based at Kadena Airfield, Okinawa. John returned from overseas in August 1946 and was relieved from active duty. He elected to remain in the Army Air Force Reserve, and was based at Westover Field, Massachusetts. While flying with this unit, he met one of the pilots of the three crews deployed to the Pacific in F-7s. It turns out that the pilot and crew that replaced John and crew (the flight leader's friend) went out on a mission and did not return: Such is fate!

John did not follow a career in aviation; he went to college on the GI Bill and entered into the petroleum industry. He went to work for Magnolia Petroleum Corporation, which later became Mobil Oil Corporation. John retired from Mobil Oil in 1985, and has been volunteering at the Cavanaugh Flight Museum since 1994.

The Cavanaugh Flight Museum is a non-profit 501(c)(3) educational organization devoted to promoting aviation studies and to perpetuating America's aviation heritage; the museum fulfills its mission by restoring, operating, maintaining and displaying historically-significant, vintage aircraft, and by collecting materials related to the history of aviation.

The museum is open 9-5 Monday through Saturday and 11-5 on Sunday. Admission to the museum is \$8.00 Adults, \$4.00 Children 6-12, 5 and under are free. For more information, call the museum at (972) 380-8800 or visit us online at www.CavanaughFlightMuseum.com.



## WHAT EVERY DUCK CREEK RESIDENT NEEDS TO KNOW... Trash & Debris Home Occupation/Garage Sales

#### **Neighborhood Integrity Program**

The Neighborhood Integrity Program was created to help maintain property values and neighborhood desirability and to encourage revitalization. This takes a concerted effort from all of Duck Creek's owners and residents. By working together, we can help keep Duck Creek an attractive, healthy, and safe place to live. Over the years, minimum property maintenance standards have been established to help realize this goal.

#### **High Grass and Weeds**

Residents are responsible for maintaining the grass and weeds at their property. Grass and weeds are in violation when they reach a height of 12 inches. Owners or residents are also responsible for maintaining the alley easement adjacent to their property.

#### Vegetation

Trees, bushes, shrubs, vines, etc. must be kept trimmed 7 feet above sidewalks, 14 feet above streets and alleys and 1 foot back from the alley pavement. Vegetation should be maintained so that it does not obstruct the view of persons using public streets and alleys.

#### Fences

Property owners are responsible for maintaining the condition of the fences around their property. Fences which are leaning severely or which are missing slats or sections are in violation of the City's Code. New fences or significant replacement of existing fences require a building permit. Call the Building Inspection Department at 972-744-4180 for more information.

#### **Address Numbers**

To enable the Police and Fire Departments to respond quickly to emergency calls, address numbers must be posted so that they are plainly visible from the street and alley. Numbers must be posted on the curb or curbside mailbox. Street numbers are also required on the front of the residence on the house, garage, fence, or other structure between 3 and 10 feet from the ground. Numbers must be a minimum of 3 inches high.

#### **Outside Strorage**

Storage is prohibited in the front yard, carport, and front porch. All items stored outside must be screened from adjacent properties, streets and alleys by a 6-foot, solid wooden fence. Outside storage is limited to 1 percent or a residential lot. This ordinance does not pertain to operable vehicles with a valid state license and registration.

#### Trash & Debris

Residents are responsible for ensuring that their property is free of any litter or debris. In an effort to control litter, residential trash must be contained in approved plastic bags and place out only on your collection days. If you wish to dispose of (rather than recycle) small bundles of branches, they should be cut to 3-foot lengths and places out on your regular collection day. Call 972-744-4111 to collect brush and bulky items placed at the curb on your special collection day. Branches of any length can be collected from your curb and converted to mulch, which is available to all Duck Creek residents for free. Duck Creek has convenient recycling known as the Blue Bag Recycling program.

#### **Minimum Property Standards**

All buildings are required to be maintained by keeping all exterior materials (brick, wood, siding, roofs, glass, windows, doors) free of holes and breaks. All wood surfaces are to be painted, protected from the elements, and in good condition.

#### Vehicles

Junked or inoperative vehicles may not be stored in public view. Trucks with a rated capacity of more than 1.5 tons and construction trailers greater than 8 feet in length may not be stored in a residential district.

If you want to operate a business from your home, please contact us to ensure that your business does not violate the home occupation ordinance.

Each resident may conduct no more than three garage sales per year, lasting no longer than three consecutive days.



Vehicles may not be parked on the grass between the front building line and the street, or between the side building line and the street on corner lots. In addition, vehicles may not be parked on the grass on vacant or unimproved lots



#### **Neighborhood Trends**

- Duck Creek is home to a population that is growing older.
- Residents are drawn to the neighborhood by its parks, recreational areas, convenient location and good home values.
- Residents are perceived as friendly, respectful of others, and proud of their neighborhood.
- The homeowners association is seen as being very important to the area, but as having room to improve.
  - Could be better at reaching out to new residents.
  - Could be better at providing interested residents with opportunities to contribute in leadership positions.
- Crime prevention remains a priority in the neighborhood, which continues to experience lower crime than the City as a whole.
- Enforcement activity in the area is slightly lower than the City as a whole and tends to be related more to routine maintenance rather than property standards:
  - Maturing trees require more maintenance.
  - Buildings are well maintained and structurally sound.
  - Small number of problem properties.
- While traffic in the area has shown slight overall increases, it has not worsened considerably over the past few years.
- Rental property in the neighborhood accounts for a lower incidence of residential properties than the City as a whole.
- Homes in the neighborhood are selling on average for less per square foot than homes in the City as a whole.
- Although certain properties remain issues of concern for the neighborhood, commercial property in general has shown signs of improvement.
  - The Block is seen as being a positive development for the area.
- Re-tenanting in developments at the corner of Belt Line and Plano Road (Target, Staples, Conn's) demonstrate the area's viability

#### Improved Commercial / Retail

#### Strategies.....

- Work with the City, County, and Chamber of Commerce to explore potential existing incentive programs to attract development.
- Reach out to local business owners to establish partnerships and promote positive interactions with the neighborhood.
- Encourage the viability of local businesses through targeted support and promotion programs within the neighborhood.
- Establish partnerships with nearby associations to create and promote a shared vision for commercial redevelopment.


